Gregor Schöllgen, born in 1952, is a professor of modern history at Erlangen University and has also taught in New York, Oxford and London. He plans and advises on historical exhibitions and documentations, writes for press, radio and television, is co-editing the records of the Foreign Office in Berlin and Willy Brandt's papers and has written numerous non-fiction books and biographies.

If one wants to understand the complex and conflict-fraught present day one has to understand the past. The history of the last 100 years is the history of worldwide wars that are linked with each other.

Gregor Schöllgen gives a vivid account of the most important conflicts and political divides that have been dominating global events up until now. 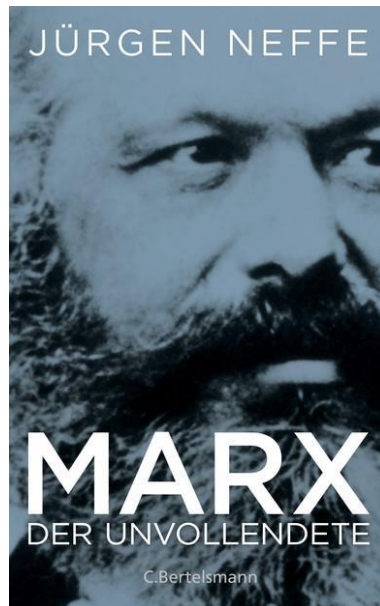
The 20th century was less than a year old when a group of young dropouts went to live in Ascona on Lake Maggiore. 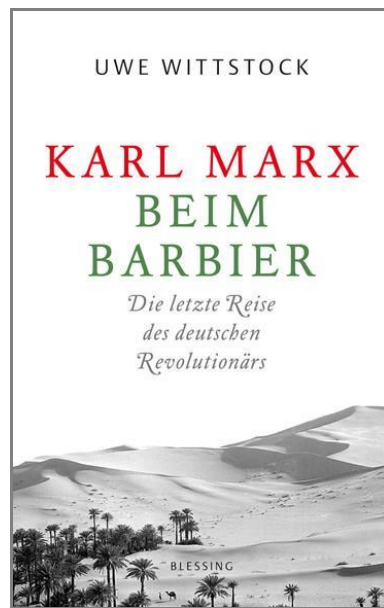

Uwe Wittstock, born in 1955, was literature editor of the *Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung* from 1980 until 1989 under the aegis of Marcel Reich-Ranicki and was awarded the Theodor Wolff Prize in 1989 for his work as a journalist. He was then an editor at S. Fischer Verlag and cultural correspondent for *Die Welt*. Since 2010 he has been literature editor of *Focus*, the weekly news magazine. His most recent publication was a volume of essays, *After Modernism*, about present-day German literature.

In February 1982, Karl Marx boards the steamer "Said" in Marseille and leaves Europe for the first time in his life. He is welcomed at the quay in Algiers by Albert Fermé, who had been involved in the Paris Commune. While taking in his impressions of a culture that is completely new for him, he looks back on his life and work: his liberally minded father of Jewish stock, his wild university days in Bonn and Berlin, his early poetic ambitions, the strange way he held back in the revolutionary year of 1848, then his never-ending exile and the inflictions of poverty.

In Algiers, Karl Marx has his photograph taken one last time before sacrificing his magnificent head of hair and beard at the barber's – an act that he himself almost sees as symbolic. Uwe Wittstock recounts a hitherto little known episode late in Karl Marx's life and uses it to examine the life and work of this great mind, one that is at the same time deeply contradictory.

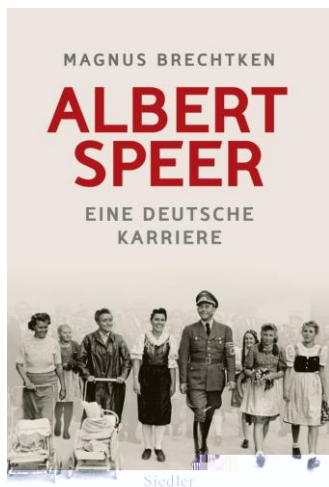
