

He writes regularly about politics for the *London Review of Books* and hosts the widely acclaimed weekly podcast Talking Politics.

The Alternative Story of Art

Katy Hessel

From the art historian behind Instagram's @GreatWomenArtists comes the accessible book of art history for our times

Could you name twenty women artists? Katy Hessel couldn't – and yet women produce great art – and always have. The problem is in how and whether they're recognised, and written about. As the lack of female-led art shows comes up at museums and galleries around the world, as does the lack of women's art in permanent collections, *The Alternative Story of Art* is going to help change our sense of who made art history.

Starting with the Renaissance and ending with the women defining art for the 2020s, Katy Hessel breaks down the chapters by date and period, contextualising the history and when the artist is working, encouraging us to engage with overlooked or dismissed forms of art, emphasising women, gender non-conformists and those considered Outsiders. From Baroque trailblazer Artemisia Gentileschi to Judith Leyster in the Dutch Golden Age, Harriet Powers in the nineteenth-century USA and the works of Brazilian artist Tarsila do Amaral in the post-War era and Nijideka Akunyili Crosby in Nigeria today, this is the history of art as it's never been told before. Putting women at the forefront, right where they belong.

Katy Hessel is a twenty-six year-old art historian, presenter and curator. Best known for running @thegreatwomenartists, an Instagram account with 145,000 followers dedicated to celebrating female artists on a daily basis, she has collaborated with Tate, Barbican, Hauser & Wirth and Dior, among others. The host of the Great Women Artists Podcast, with over 400,000 downloads, Katy Hessel has written extensively for *Phaidon* and *British Vogue*, interviewed the likes of Tracey Emin to Zadie Smith, lectured at Cambridge University and the National Gallery, curated shows at Victoria Miro Gallery and Timothy Taylor Gallery, and presented programmes for the BBC. She also hosts Dior's podcast, Dior Talks – Feminist Art.

The European Art World 1905-14

Philip Hook

Sotheby's art expet Philip Hook explores the ten years that made modern art as we know it

The years leading up to the First World War were the most exciting, frenzied and revolutionary in the history of art. This was the crucible of Modernism, when Fauvism, Expressionism, Cubism, Futurism and finally Abstract Art all developed in quick succession.

There were phenomenal new innovations in avant garde painting and sculpture, above all in Paris where a community of artists, critics and collectors was flourishing.

Picasso, Matisse, Modigliani, Kandinsky, Malevich, Klimt and Schiele all came to prominence during this period, though few understood their genius.

Although extraordinary new works were being created, conventional art still continued to be produced and widely appreciated. Exhibitions – of old masters and of new art – were held to huge public interest, shock and horror. The styles made popular in the nineteenth century held sway and many people's tastes remained conservative. During this perion, 1905–1914, there was the biggest boom in prices for old masters in history, while most of the avant-garde lived like paupers.

This was a unique generation, though many of their lives were cut tragically short by the outbreak of war. Sotheby's art expert Philip Hook explains how it took less than a decade for everything to change.



In 2011, without warning, a skyscraper in South Korea began to shake uncontrollably and was immediately evacuated. Was it an earthquake? A terrorist attack? No one seemed quite sure. 'Late at night I lay awake in my hotel bed, listening to the sounds of a city at war: the distant thuds of mortars crashing at the Green Zone followed by the monotonous din of supply convoys shrouded in the safety of the dark curfew hours, the hoarse howling of street dogs. Dawn will break soon, and shortly afterwards clashes will resume, and car-bombs will start blowing up in the morning rush hour. The sounds, like the war, had become repetitive, rhythmic and very predictable.'

Since 9/11 the Middle East has been riven by war, the lines between enemies and allies shifting and reforming, often street by street, in urban areas where combatants and civilians live uneasily together. From his own experiences in Baghdad, Mosul, Aden and Aleppo, Ghaith Abdulahad weaves together a uniquely rich and lyrical account of the past twenty years through the eyes of those who live there: smugglers and soldiers, extremists and pragmatists, those that don't want to leave and those who can't get away.

Ghaith Abdulahad is an Iraqi journalist and winner of the Martha Gellhorn Prize for Journalism, the James Cameron Memorial Trust Award, the British Press Awards' Foreign Reporter of the Year and the Orwell Prize for Journalism. He has written for the *Guardian, London Review of Books* and *Washington Post* and published photographs in *The New York Times, Los Angeles Times* and *The Times*. Besides reporting from Iraq, he has also reported from Somalia, Sudan, Afghanistan, Yemen, Libya and Syria, often behind enemy lines.


Inside the Cold War Mind Martin Sixsmith

Daily Life in Old English Hana Videen

English as you've never seen it before – a glorious collection of old English words for fans of Lynne Truss and Mark Forsyth

Why is a spider a walking-weaver? When is un-tima and why mustn't we do anything then? And what exactly is bee-food?

Old English is the language we think we know until we actually hear or see it. Used by the Anglo-Saxons over a thousand years ago, it is rich with words that haven't changed at all (like word, in fact), others that are unrecognisable (like neorxnawang, or paradise) and some that are totally untranslatable (gafol-fisc, literally tax-fish).

A lifelong stutterer dismantles the cult of fluency and champions the creative powers of inarticulacy

In an age of polished TED talks and overconfident political oratory, success seems to depend upon charismatic public speaking. But what if hyperfluency is not only unachievable but undesirable?

Jonty Claypole spent fifteen years of his life in and out of extreme speech therapy. From sessions with child psychologists to lengthy stuttering boot camps and exposure therapies, he tried everything until finally being told the words he'd always feared: 'We can't cure your stutter.' Those words started him on a journey towards not only making peace with his stammer but learning to use it to his advantage.

Here, Jonty argues that our obsession with fluency could be hindering, rather than helping, our creativity, authenticity and persuasiveness. Exploring other speech conditions, such as aphasia and Tourette's, and telling the stories of the 'creatively disfluent' – from Lewis Carroll to Kendrick Lamar – Jonty explains why it's time for us to stop making sense, get tongue tied and embrace the life-changing power of inarticulacy.

Jonty Claypole is Director of BBC Arts, Chairman of the arts centre HOME in Manchester, and was listed in the *Bookseller's* Top 100 Most Influential People.





Every language in the world shares a few common features: we can ask a question, say something belongs to us, and tell someone what to do. But beyond that, our languages are richly and almost infinitely varied: a French speaker can't conceive of a world that isn't split into un and une, male and female, while Estonians have only one word for both men and women: tema. In Dyirbal, an Australian language, things might be masculine, feminine, neuter - or edible vegetable.

Every language tells us something about the people who use it. Born in the USSR, she has lived and worked in the Amazon region of Brazil and Papua New Guinea, and speaks (among others) Estonian, Hebrew, Portuguese, Tariana, French, German, Yiddish and Tok Pisin, a Papuan language in which she occasionally dreams.





The definitive account of the Irish Civil War (1922–3)

Two years after the Easter Rising and the declaration of an Irish Republic, Sinn Féin won the 1918 general election on a platform advocating secession from the British Empire, rejecting British offers of limited self-government. Britain responded with repression. The three years of unrest that followed would become known as the War of Independence.

But the collapse of British Administration in Ireland during the summer of 1921 did not bring peace. Instead, the proposed Anglo-Irish treaty – which sought to make Ireland a Dominion within the Empire, asked leaders to swear allegiance to the King, and allowed Northern Ireland to remain in the UK – divided the IRA. Within a year these divisions escalated into armed conflict.

The Irish Civil war may have lasted from 1922–3 but its consequences have shaped Ireland into the twenty-first century.

Diarmaid Ferriter is one of Ireland's best- known historians and is Professor of Modern Irish History at UCD. He is a regular broadcaster on television and radio and a weekly columnist with the *Irish Times*. In 2010 he presented a three-part history of twentieth century Ireland, *The Limits of Liberty*, on RTE television, and is the author of *The Border*, *Occasions of Sin, Ambiguous Republic*, and the *Transformation of Ireland*.



Lydia Harvey was meant to disappear. She was young and working class; she had walked the streets, worked in brothels, and had no money of her own. In 1910, politicians, pimps, policemen and moral reformers saw her as just one of many 'girls who disappeared'. But when she took the stand to give testimony at the trial of her traffickers, she ensured she would never be forgotten.

Historian Julia Laite traces Lydia's extraordinary life from her home in New Zealand to the streets of Buenos Aires and safe houses of London. Along the way, she tells the stories of the cunning criminals, the detectives who invented international policing, the reporter who discovered the story of sex trafficking, and the woman who made it her life's mission to help abused and disbelieved women.

It insists that these small histories can tell us just as much, if not more, about the forces that shaped the 20th century as can those sweeping histories that dominate our shelves.



The Suez Crisis of 1956 was the nadir of Britain's twentieth century, the moment when the once-superpower was forced to accept a secondary role in global affairs. 

Many people think mathematics is useless. Professor Ian Stewart knows that their wrong. 



How Bad Are Bananas? was a groundbreaking book when first published in 2009, when most of us were hearing the phrase 'carbon footprint' for the first time. 

In each race, a pacemaker leads nine riders around huge concrete velodromes, then leaves the track with around a lap and a half to go – the cue for a frantic finish as the competitors reach speeds of up to 70 kph. Along the way they block and shove each other, clash heads and occasionally crash.







He writes for *Il Sole 24 Ore* and *La Stampa*, is the editor of *Storia d'Europa e del Mediterraneo* and regularly appears on television and radio. In 2005, the Republic of France awarded Barbero with the title of Chevalier de l'ordre des Arts et des Lettres.

Allan Cameron was born in 1952, grew up in Nigeria and Bangladesh, and lived as a young adult in Italy. He has translated twenty-four books including *The Anonymous Novel* by Alessando Barbero. He lives in Glasgow.


In 1939, the Gestapo created a list of names: the Britons whose removal would be the Nazis' first priority in the event of a successful invasion. Who were they? What had they done to provoke Germany? For the first time, the historian Sybil Oldfield uncovers their stories and reveals why the Nazis feared their influence.

Those on the hitlist – more than half of them naturalised refugees – were many of Britain's most gifted and humane inhabitants. Among their numbers we find the writers E. M. Forster and Virginial Woolf, humanitarians and religious leaders, scientists and artists, the social reformers Margery Fry and Eleanor Rathbone MP, the artists Jacob Epstein and Oscar Kokoschka.

By examining these targets of Nazi hatred, Oldfield not only sheds light on the Gestapo worldview; she also movingly reveals a network of truly exemplary Britons: mavericks, moral visionaries and unsung heroes.

Sybil Oldfield is half German and half English. Her grandmother was a pacifist feminist socialist who was placed under Schreibverbot during the Nazi dictatorship. Her mother was classified as an 'enemy alien naturalized by marriage' in Britain after the Second World War broke out. Oldfield is now Emeritus Reader in English at the University of Sussex and a researcher for *The Oxford Dictionary of National Biography*. A nuclear pacifist, she has campaigned on the psychological disarmament side of the anti-war movement since the 1960s.
