A harrowing account of the tragic fates of World War II prisoners

Hunger, fear and hard labour were part of everyday life for the roughly 35 million people who were POWs during the Second World War. Among them were more than 11 million Germans, some of whom didn't return home until the mid-1950s. Today, the majority of Germans have a father, grandfather or great-grandfather who was a POW. Spiegel authors Bohr and Schnurr have retraced the POWs' steps and reveal how the trauma of their imprisonment still affects many of their descendants. They also describe the suffering of millions of foreign POWs who were forced to do hard labour in German camps and murdered using poison gas and starvation – their murderers largely got away with it, and Germany and Austria remained silent on the subject for decades.

But it wasn't just male soldiers on active service who became POWs: this book also tells the story of female Soviet soldiers, scientists, and the Jewish refugees in Britain who were treated as "enemy aliens".

The catastrophe happens over coffee and cake: on a visit to his mother's childhood friend in March 1943, Karlrobert Kreiten, a consummate 26-year-old pianist with a promising future ahead of him, claims that Germany has lost the war, and the Führer his mind. Six months after making these unguarded comments, he dies on the gallows.

Kreiten's tragic fate is at the centre of "Days of Darkness", Oliver Hilmes's superb account of life in Germany in 1943. That year, an entire army is wiped out at Stalingrad, and Goebbels calls for a 'total war'; children are moved to the countryside for their safety, while millions of Germans crowd into cinemas to see the movie star Hans Albers as Baron Munchausen; the cities are already lying in ruins, yet people keep dancing; and while the Nazis' 'machinery of destruction' is firing on all cylinders, some fantasise about the 'final victory' even as others try to stand up to the dictatorship.

In this brilliantly devised and meticulously researched kaleidoscope of stories and character portraits, Hilmes brings the dramatic events of 1943 back to life.

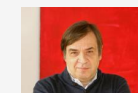

The historian Peter Longerich, born in 1955, was Professor of Modern German History at Royal Holloway, University of London, where he founded the Holocaust Research Centre, and taught at the German Armed Forces University in Munich from 2013 to 2018. He is an internationally renowned expert on the history of National Socialism, and has published numerous books – including *Politik der Vernichtung* ('Policy of extermination', 1998) and *Davon haben wir nichts gewusst!* ('We knew nothing about it!', 2006), which are considered required reading in Germany. He won worldwide acclaim with his biographies of Heinrich Himmler (2008), Joseph Goebbels (2010) and Adolf Hitler (2015), and his most recent titles are *Wannsee: The Road to the Final Solution* (2016) and *Antisemitismus. Eine deutsche Geschichte* ('Anti-Semitism: A German History', 2021).

The largely unknown story of young Jewish men and women who fought against the Nazi regime in Berlin


Some of them were just nineteen or twenty years old when they joined the Berlin resistance to fight Hitler and Nazi propaganda. In 1942, the group, led by electrician Herbert Baum, organised an arson attack on a propaganda exhibition in Berlin's Lustgarten, but were arrested shortly afterwards and sentenced to death. In western Germany, this group has been overshadowed by the White Rose; in East Germany, however, it was considered – and exploited as – a symbol of anti-fascism. In "In the Shadow of the Stars", Scheer draws on a mosaic of letters, files and interviews with survivors to tell the very personal story of a largely unknown chapter in Germany history, as well as the way it has been dealt with since the war. It is a sensitive and vivid portrait of a group of young people who fought the Nazis despite the dangers they faced due to their Jewish origins and political convictions.

The origins of a historical catastrophe

When the Reichstag burnt down in 1933, Adolf Hitler had only been Chancellor for four weeks. In the subsequent hours and days, thousands were arrested and terror spread throughout the country. Yet the circumstances of the arson attack remained shrouded in mystery: was it caused by a single arsonist, as many claim – or was it, rather, a targeted political act organised by the Nazis? If so, might it be described as a coup perpetrated by the government against its own people? In "Arson", Soukup searches for the truth behind what happened that night, and scrutinises the accounts that were constructed during the post-war years. With the help of historical sources, recently uncovered evidence and his own investigations, Soukup sheds a new light on the events surrounding the fire, as well as on the no less fascinating, bitter, decades-long row about who started it – involving blackmail, forged and concealed evidence, and the question of who gets to decide the truth.

Turtles can do amazing things: some can dive to more than 1,000 metres, others transport organisms across the seas (and thus contribute to their distribution), others act as "architects of the oceans" by helping to spread coral reefs along the sea bed. All have impressive "super-senses", which mean they're able to return to the beaches where they were born – often decades later, and from thousands of kilometres away. They orient themselves by the earth's magnetic field, as well as their sense of smell, which allows them to recognise the scent of their first beach. When we think of wilderness, we think of places like forests filled with an abundance of wild plants – landscapes that show no trace of human civilisation. After all, man and primordial nature are mutually exclusive. In fact, though, wilderness always implies a certain tug of war between different forces: wherever we disturb the balance, nature cannot take its course, and what remains isn't wilderness, but an impoverished landscape – even if we leave nature to its own devices. Even now, the forests we once exploited contain just a fraction of the animals, plants and fungi that once existed there. Why is that? Biologist and filmmaker Haft examines flawed ideas, proposes a new way of conceiving of wilderness, and explains how – if we wanted to – we could easily and cheaply create new animal-friendly, sustainable and diverse landscapes.

MY LIFE AS A PROFESSIONAL HUNTER AND VINTNER IN TUNE WITH NATURE

A young professional hunter and vintner demonstrates how to live a sustainable life while treating humans, nature and animals with care and respect

Thirty-one-year-old hunter and vintner Shanna's life is both idyllic and challenging – such as when she and her dachshund Henriette climb to the raised hide before dawn on chilly winter mornings; when she tracks roe deer through the vineyards and has to decide when to cull them; or when she and her grandfather once again argue about which is better: old-school or modern hunting methods. She always tries to look at the big picture, though. For Shanna, who used to be a vegetarian, hunting represents various important principles: on the one hand, it's an act of animal and nature conservation – if one species grows too quickly, the result is inevitably excessive competition and accidents, causing harm to both animals and habitat; at the same time, hunting is also a responsible alternative to intensive farming. Whether you hunt game or make wine – to enjoy life, you need to treat nature with great care, while never forgetting its beauty. In "Wild at Heart", which is a love letter to living in, with and off nature, Shanna takes us to her family's vineyard and on the trail of deer, describes a typical year in the life of a vintner and professional hunter, and explains the relationship between hunting and sustainability.

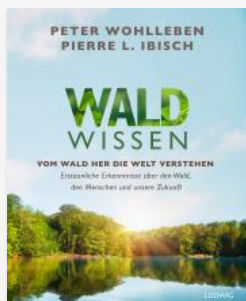

"Beyond their military ethos and control-freakery, the Taliban have no concrete idea of how to turn a state that failed all those years ago into a functioning country. Afghanistan is a kind of North Korea with a beard and a courteous manner, but without a plan."

Reuter has been reporting from Afghanistan for twenty years. Hardly any other foreign reporter knows the country as well as he does. He was in Kabul when the Taliban seized power in August 2021, and remained behind when other western aid workers, soldiers and journalists hastily boarded the planes. More than that: he even travelled to regions where no foreigner had been allowed to set foot for decades, and stayed there for months.

The accounts that Reuter has brought back from his road trip through a country thrown into turmoil by regime change are stories of dramatic change and hopeless stagnation, of a Taliban out of its depth and assertive provincial governors, of farmers ploughing dust and women fearing for their safety. In this compelling and very personal book, Reuter dives deep into Afghanistan's present and past, and asks what the future holds for this country and its new rulers.

Christoph Reuter, born in 1968, is regularly among the last western journalists to leave a crisis zone, be it Syria, northern Iraq or Afghanistan. He has a degree in Islamic studies and speaks fluent Arabic. He has worked for Die Zeit and Stern, and joined the Spiegel as a correspondent in 2011. In addition to numerous prize-winning reports, Reuter has also published books, including "Mein Leben ist eine Waffe" ('My life is a weapon', 2002), about suicide bombers, and – together with Susanne Fischer – "Café Bagdad" (2004), about everyday life in war-torn Iraq. He was named Reporter of the Year for his investigation of ISIS, and his bestselling "Die schwarze Macht. Der 'Islamische Staat' und die Strategen des Terrors" ('Dark Power: ISIS and the Strategists of Terror', 2015) won the NDR Non-Fiction Prize for Culture. He has also won the 2022 Hanns Joachim Friedrichs Prize for TV Journalism for his reports from the war in Ukraine.

Compelling reportage from a country in the midst of war


War didn't come to Ukraine in February 2022 – it has been a reality in the country since 2014. Nine years ago, Russian soldiers covertly invaded Donbas, and started a war of attrition whose goal was the secession of this eastern Ukrainian territory. Without this long-term conflict – which cost so many lives, yet which Europe hardly paid any attention to – we cannot understand its current phase, the Ukrainians' reaction to it, and the Ukrainian army's highly organised and effective resistance to the Russian invaders, which caught many external observers by surprise. Award-winning reporter Schulz has many contacts in Ukraine, a country he has written about for years and where he has also worked as a journalist. In the reports collected here, he accompanies the people who have spent years living with war – the civilians, soldiers, students and artists who constitute the country's resistance, and who have been fighting for a free and democratic Ukraine – and asks what this war, which is likely to continue for a long time yet, has done to the Ukrainians: those who have been fighting, those who have been holding out, and those who have fled.

Rethinking climate change and democracy

Many people think that protecting our climate and democracy are mutually exclusive. He exposes false contradictions, and argues that what we need is "climate democracy" – for the climate crisis is already starting to limit our freedoms, and we'll only be able to save the planet by democratic means. "Democracy in Flames" takes a new look at the relationship between democracy and climate change, and sketches an optimistic vision of a future where the two reinforce each other.

How China's investments and networks are encroaching on western governments

China has long been considered a kind of gentle sleeping giant. Its political system and human rights violations may be hard to reconcile with democratic values, but many have hoped that increasing trade would help bring about change in the country. China, they believed, would open up more and more as its wealth increased. In fact, the opposite has happened: China has closed itself off from the outside world, while exerting huge economic and political influence. Since 2013, the Communist Party has created new markets and opened up new Silk Roads via credit lines, investments and development projects. If you look closely, you'll quickly see that China is exporting not just products, but its ideology, hegemony and economic and political oppression. The "new Silk Road" is a dirty project: the Communist Party is infiltrating democratic governments, stealthily hollowing out western liberal and capitalist norms, supporting authoritarian regimes, and ignoring human rights and climate change. The events in Ukraine show just how influential China has become even in Europe.

In this book, veteran China correspondent Mattheis visits the countries that flank the new Silk Road, from Kazakhstan to Hungary, from Sri Lanka to Georgia and from Greece to Germany, uncovers the methods and consequences of China's economic and geopolitical policy, and argues that we must bear our share of the responsibility and rethink the status quo.

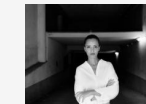

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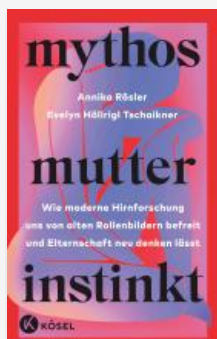

Every three days, a woman dies as a result of male violence. So despite all the achievements of the past decades, there is still no sign of gender justice. And how could there be, since the world of children already seems to be divided into two parts: pink and blue, loving and wild, caring and competitive. This dichotomy cements prevailing injustices and deprives the women and men of tomorrow of very concrete opportunities to shape their own lives.

The culture journalist Anne Waak analyses how toxic cultures of masculinity and femininity are (re)produced at home, in kindergarten or at school, and formulates a true-to-life and undogmatic plea to all caregivers: Only if we raise our children to be feminists will we overcome the gender pay gap, male self-destruction, violence against women, and will we be able to free our society from the high costs of patriarchy.

A year is a long time in a concentration camp. It is a time that divides life into a before and after. Rachel Hanan was 15 when she was sent to a concentration camp, and survived Auschwitz, Bergen-Belsen, Duderstadt and Theresienstadt; when she was liberated, she was just shy of 16. The year she spent in the camps has given her nightmares and dark thoughts – but it also made her realise that love can keep you alive. 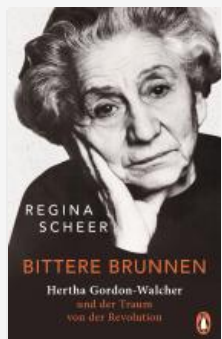

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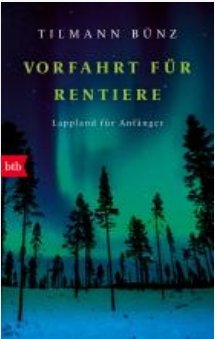
