



After graduating with a Master's degree in English literature, he went to Japan for 'just one year' and returned to England ten years later to attend the Creative Writing MA at UEA, graduating in 2016. He has worked in a variety of jobs, including Japanese teacher, English teacher, video game translator, travel writer, and photographer. He speaks Japanese fluently, and undertook a PhD funded by the Great Britain Sasakawa Foundation in Creative & Critical Writing at UEA, focusing on the figure of the cat in Japanese literature. His debut novel, *The Cat* & The City (Atlantic, 2020) has been reprinted over nine times. His second novel, Four Seasons in Japan, was chosen as a 'Book of the Year' by the TLS. His novels have been translated into almost twenty foreign languages.







A chilling ghost story in which a mother and daughter move into a crumbling house haunted by the ghost of a girl who performed in Victorian freak shows, through which wind whistles eerily, floorboards creak ominously and things go bump in the night. The Turn of the Screw meets Alice Hoffman's The Museum of Extraordinary Things.

Following the break-up of a controlling marriage, single mother Nell moves into the crumbling Victorian Merry Hall with her teenage daughter, Fern. She's determined to make a new life but the noises, moving objects, and strange smells in her new home make her increasingly unsettled.

In the 1840s, showman Abel Wenham seduces Dolly, a talented albino girl and makes her the star of his performing collection of 'freaks'. But after she becomes pregnant with his child, he discards her and imprisons her at Merry Hall, where her only solace is the company of fellow performers Ada the Bear Lady and the Jack the Posturer. They plan to escape with Dolly and her child and set up in business, but Wenham has other ideas.

When Fern admits she, too, is pregnant, it seems as though history may be about to repeat itself. But is Dolly, just one of the ghosts that haunt Merry Hall, reaching out across the centuries to protect her own child?

The Ghosts of Merry Hall is a chilling ghost story, a story about control, family relationships and love.

<u>Heather Davey</u> has an MA in Writing (with distinction) from Bath Spa University and is an alumna of the Curtis Brown Creative Finish Your Novel course. She is a librarian and a forthcoming judge for the Yoto Carnegie Medals in 2025 and 2026. She lives in Dorset with her husband and two children. Heather has always been fascinated by ghost stories and was a key contributor to the recent BBC 2 series, *Uncanny*, with Danny Robins.







Being officially infertile is, somehow, easier than telling people she didn't want to have a baby anyway – but she does want something to love and care for. It's something, she explains to her husband, to do with being a woman – though she's not quite sure that's

When she hears about a female horse whose owner needs help looking after her part-time, it sounds like an ideal arrangement. At first the mare is simply a prism for seeing the world afresh. Can she be captured in metaphor or translated into written or drawn language? Is her femaleness different from human femaleness?

Over the course of a year, while the woman undergoes medical treatment for premature menopause, she finds solace in caring for the horse. Through riding lessons and the repetition of chores, first a language, and then a bond, begins to develop between them. But when affection grows into obsession, she must confront what it means to love a being who did not come from her body and who does not belong to her.

Mare challenges the idea of contemporary motherhood and how we think about female bodies, both human and other-than-human. It asks how family can be made in the modern world, beyond the constraints of biological reproduction.

Not everything that glitters is gold - which is why Ben Aitken gave London the cold shoulder and went to Preston instead.

Hailing from Portsmouth, Ben knew from experience that unfashionable places could be quietly brilliant. So, over the course of a year, the author of *A Chip Shop in Poznan* and *The Gran Tour* visited twelve of the least popular spots in the UK and Ireland for a city break. The motivation wasn't to take the mickey or stick the boot in, but to seek out the good stuff, to uncover the gems, to have a nice time. By doing so, he hoped to demonstrate that anywhere — like anyone — can be interesting and nourishing and enjoyable if approached in the right fashion.

Ben went skiing in Sunderland, to the football in Wrexham, and fell in love with Dunfermline. He kissed an alpaca in Bradford, suffered jellied eels in Chelmsford, and had more craic in Limerick than was wise. The upshot is a celebration of the underdog; a hymn to the wrong direction; and evidence that there's no such thing as a shitty break. What's more, by spreading its affection beyond the usual suspects (which are often overdone and overpriced), *Shitty Breaks* promotes a less expensive and more sustainable brand of travel.

By ghosting Bath and giving Lisbon the boot, the book champions the unsung in an algorithmic, over-signposted world dominated by celebs and hotspots. Cheeky weekend in Milton Keynes anyone?



In the style of *Crying in H Mart* and *Minor Feelings*, Jill Damatac blends memoir, food writing, and colonial history as she cooks her way through recipes from her native-born Philippines and shares stories of her undocumented family in America.

Jill Damatac left the US in the early 2020s after living there as an undocumented immigrant with her family for 22 years. America was the only home she knew, where invisibility had become her identity – her mother tongue and indigenous roots long buried – and where poverty, domestic violence and xenophobia were everyday experiences.

First traveling to her native Philippines, she eventually landed in London, where, married to a British citizen, she finally obtained documents and was free to pursue an education at Cambridge University, fully investigate her roots and to process what happened to her and her family.

Interweaving forgotten colonial history and long-buried indigenous traditions, Damatac takes us through her time in America, cooking her way through Filipino recipes in her kitchen as she searches for a sense of self and renewed possibility. With emotional intelligence, clarity, and grace, *Dirty Kitchen* explores fractured memories to ask questions of identity, colonialism, immigration, belonging, and to find ways in which the ritual, tradition, and comfort of food, can answer them.



In the past, we were deeply bound to plants. But we no longer understand nature as we once did. We value a plant for its use, often processing it until it barely approximates what once grew in the ground. We have lost a sense of plants as precious.

Vanishing Landscapes tells the story of how this happened – and with it the history of how we became modern. From the 1500s, in the space of just two hundred years, plants disappeared from our daily lives one by one. First were apples, then household medicines like saffron, cloth dyes like woad and then, eventually, the timber from which we built houses and the wheat we grew for our bread. In their place came the first corporation, the first factory, the banking system, private property, global trade, and the professionalisation of medicine.

Lazarus will be the first biography of the legendary musician, actor and cultural phenomenon to focus solely on the second half of his career, spanning the period from late 1991 until his death in 2016.

There have been countless books covering Bowie's Seventies' rise to fame and his brief, unlikely period as a world-conquering pop star in the Eighties. Yet the quarter-century that began with Bowie a diminished figure, mired in the failure of his Tin Machine experiment, and ended with him releasing his final masterpiece, *Blackstar*, and being hailed on his death as perhaps the greatest musician of the twentieth century, has been neglected; confined to a few rushed chapters in even the most comprehensive accounts of Bowie's life.





Built by slave labour in the early years of the eighteenth century, Saint Petersburg was Peter the Great's so-called 'window on to Europe', a city that would outdo all of Europe in its splendour.

But a window works both ways, and as best-selling historian Sinclair McKay writes, St Petersburg has always been a city that has drawn Westerners who wanted to see into Russia. 

I've met hundreds of people who have died, were resuscitated and lived. I've long thought that these are the people that we should be listening to, not influencers or business gurus. They know what really matters.'

It happened in an instant. Ed was walking through a park with his friend Stuart when there was a bang, a bright light and then nothing. Ed and Stuart had been hit by a bolt of lightning -300 million volts, enough to power a city for a day, coursed through their bodies, short-circuiting their hearts. Ed was found first, given life-saving CPR to start his heart again: he survived and had a second chance. He lives life a little differently now, every day knowing the thin margins that separate life and death.

In this book, Dr Matt Morgan meets people whose hearts have stopped and have been brought back from clinical death. Powerfully crafted, this is important and accessible nature writing blended with insightful memoir.



An uplifting resource for anyone facing challenges in their quest to become a parent, inviting women and men from around the world to share their experience in a style similar to *Want* by Gillian Anderson.

For some, trying to conceive can be incredibly straightforward but plenty of others struggle to become parents. What happens after the failed pregnancy tests, that first miscarriage, the unsuccessful round of IVF, the ectopic pregnancy or stillbirth? What is it like to adopt a child, rely on a surrogate, an egg or sperm donor, or come to terms with not having a child at all? So many of us don't talk about it.

When Audrey Ward was going through her own battle to make a baby, she scoured online message boards for stories of women whose journeys in some way mirrored hers or for tales which would offer hope or highlight how challenges might be overcome. It was only by opening up to people she trusted that she realised how common her experience was. It's estimated that 1 in 6 people worldwide are affected by infertility.

The book will offer readers a heartfelt and realistic account of what many individuals go through in a bid to become a parent, along with advice on how to navigate the emotional and practical challenges; and it will cover subjects like miscarriage, IVF, stillbirth, egg and sperm donation, late pregnancy interrupted, adoption, surrogacy, solo parenting and even coming to terms with a life without children.

Audrey Ward has been an editor and writer at *The Sunday Times* for fifteen years and has previously worked as assistant editor on *News Review* and deputy editor of *Home*. Her account of her struggle to conceive was shortlisted for the Impress Prize for New Writers. As an interviewer, she has spoken about challenges on the path to parenthood with the likes of American Oscar-winning screenwriter, Dustin Lance Black, and Conde Nast's first black publisher, Vanessa Kingori. Her interview with Queen Elizabeth's grand-daughter Zara Tindall, during which Zara revealed that she had lost two babies following the birth of her eldest daughter, saw her become the first member of the royal family to speak publicly about miscarriage. The interview made headlines around the world. Audrey has forged strong connections with some of the top international infertility charities, and is a trustee of Surrogacy UK, helping them develop and direct their strategies and policies.
